

Fish House Chronicles

With the holidays awash behind us and time spent with family, the human batteries were recharged for another season of adventure on the high seas. And what a way to start those adventures. Moving a newly purchased motor yacht from the Washington DC area to Morehead City. This is a story worth retelling about 3 men and a lady. Although the lady has a mans name of "Old Man River" but we all know they do things a little different in Washington, DC.

The tell tale sign of an exciting event was just the land ride to Woodbridge VA. Riding on the edge of a major coastal storm moving North East. This weather event was not only a rain maker but a wind maker as well. Then the temperatures plummeted to conditions warranting thermal under garments, gloves, hoods, and fleece lined parka's.

The first morning rose with partly cloudy skies and a 20 knot stiff breeze from the North. A breakfast place was being searched for by three expert navigators who apparently had no problem getting lost in their own back yard with and without an automotive GPS. It took 20 miles of driving in circles, parking in the wrong lot, and walk trough a steel fence to search for that "Local Fare" one of the crew talked so much about. One crew member commented that we had passed a Denny's 3 times trying to find the greasy spoon. You know Denny's has a grand slam breakfast that would stay with you all day. Nope, we had to taste the local dew drop inn with dirty worn out tile floors, paper plates, and plastic forks that would break every time you tried to stab at the egg omelet made with cheese food and eggs from a questionable source.

Alas after the 2nd cup of army style coffee in a small plastic type of cup we discussed the plan to move Old Man River south. One crew said to stay put, the other said truck on and the owner looked dazzled like why should I have to be the tie breaker. More information was needed to convince everyone to get on the same page so everyone got out their I-phones to download the latest weather forecast. A call to the days destination marina for a water condition report and the results of all of this research went down like this:

The weather for today is clearing skies, temps in the upper 40's, wind from the north at 20 gusting to 25 in the afternoon. The local marina report at the end of the Potomac told us we were going to have plenty of water in the creek, and they were expecting 20 knot breezes after lunch. Alas the decision was unanimous to depart right away. With the boat already provisioned with food and supplies and equipment needed for a 3 or 4 day journey, we left the docks late morning. We were the pride of the Potomac as no one else was in the water except for us. First tell tale sign!!

It took almost 2 helmsmen and one dock hand to get "Old Man River" pushed out of the slip and into a channel so narrow and so shallow that Carolina costal water seemed deeper than the Marinara Trench. Into the Potomac she flew as the throttles were brought to cruising speed as soon as the 2nd deep water marker was rounded. Southbound and flying at 22 knots. Seas were choppy with a stiff breeze from the north. The weather began to change after 2 hours of uneventful cruising. Waves began to push and capping was seen dead ahead. 2 footers were soon the norm and shortly thereafter 2 footers changed to 3's and 4's.

The river began to widen and the waves were now rolling with troughs and swells just 3 seconds apart. A recall of that famous Ballard of the Edmund Fitzgerald began to roll in our heads as we took turns going below to discover the entire cabin had been ravaged by an angry toddler in a crib full of toys. The galley had completely spilled all of the provisions that were thought of being properly secured all over the galley floor. Nothing was safe above 2 feet high. As a matter of fact nothing was safe below at all unless it was tied and latched with the security of a vessel rigged for a rough water passage across the great pond. It was nearing 2 PM and the crew was hungry. The old cook came up on deck and said "Fellas, it's too rough to feed ya".

It was around 4 PM as we approached the end of the Potomac as she spilled all she had into the Chesapeake. Now with the Chesapeake having all day to react with the 25 knot wind pushing from the north and the Potomac having most of the day doing the same, the confluence of the two was the presentation of a perfect storm as we surfed over one set of rollers and crashed upward into another. The sound of the props came unglued as the stern was occasionally lifted from the water by the hydraulics of an angry sea that was speaking to us all, that she was completely in charge of the late afternoon frolics.

With just 20 more miles to go, we could not get that famous Ballard sung by Gordon Lightfoot out of our heads, "She would have made whitefish bay if she only put 15 more miles behind her". We had to make Smith Point Marina to find protected waters and in order to do this we had to make a course change due west right into a late afternoon setting sun. With the windshield and isling glass covered in salt spray, and a blinding sun in our faces, an instrument approach was looking as an option. We had a narrow set of rock jetty's to go between and our depth was quickly approaching 4 feet. The wind was now howling at a constant 25 knots with gusts up to 35. Sea spray was horizontal as the wind swept off the top 2 inch layer of the 6 footers that were beginning to pound against our hull.



Please Review and Update Your USPS Personal Information!

Have you changed your address recently? Bought a new phone with a new number? Have new email address? Finally gotten around to getting a MMSI for your DSC radio? Bought a new boat? All of this info is contained in the personal information records at USPS. Some of us have outdated records, so I'd like to request that everyone check their records and update them as necessary.

The process is simple and can easily be done on line:

- ! Start by going to the USPS website, usps.org
- ! At the top of the page, click on Site Index
- ! On the next page, click on Information Center
- ! Near the bottom of the left hand column on the Information Center page, click on *Manage Your Own Profile*
- ! You'll need to enter your Certificate Number and PIN here. If you haven't yet created a PIN, you'll be led through the process of creating one. (This part can be annoying. Just be patient, and follow the directions carefully.)
- ! Your Membership Information page will open. Make the appropriate updates and click on *Update* the bottom of the page. You're done!
- ! Remember your password so you can come back to the Information center to print rosters, get organization information, email Squadron members, etc.

Thanks for doing this – it makes communication within the Squadron much easier when we all have the correct information.

NOTE: I recommend all members subscribe to the Sail Angle newsletter. It applies to Sail and Power boating. Go to USPS.org for the procedure.




SailAngle Message Nautical Check Flip Charts







Fish House Chronicles

"An Angry Chesapeake" The Continued Homeward Journey of "Old Man River"

With just 20 more miles to go, we had to make Smith Point Marina to find protected waters and in order to do this we had to make a course change due west, right into a late afternoon setting sun. With the windshield and isling glass covered in salt spray, and a blinding Sun in our faces, an instrument approach was looking as an option. We had a narrow set of rock jetty's to go between and our depth was quickly approaching 4 feet. The wind was now howling at a constant 25 knots with gusts up to 35. Sea spray was horizontal as the wind swept off the top 2 inch layer of the 6 footers that were beginning to pound against our hull.

The confluence of the Chesapeake, the Potomac River, and the wind affects of the widest part of the bay had all lined up to deal some of the most challenging weather events any flat water mariner could ever expect. Some blue water cruisers may have had experiences like this but with the hydraulics of waves only 3 to 5 seconds apart, it made for even an old New England salt want to become a land lubber or at best a lake boater.

As our depth continued to shrink from 5 to 4 feet and visions of some 3 foot water, we got a glimpse of our precision instrument approach. We missed the approach to the rock jetty by 75 yards to the north. We had to make a turn directly into the storm ravaged sea and we had to endure a few broaching 6 footers against Old Man Rivers Starboard hull. Once pointed into the rolling breakers we angled our next turn so the following seas would not push us into the jetty. We gave it a wide angled approach and dead ahead was the middle of the channel. Throttles were kicked up for more power to enable better helm control, and we found ourselves between the two jetty's, dead center, and within 20 seconds the intense pounding stopped as we have crossed into the "Promise Land" of protected water.

We switched helmsman at this time to give the previous one a break from the intensity of the last 20 or so miles and it was now a clutch speed cruise between the many markers that outlined a very narrow and shallow channel. We saw our docks and approached them with caution as we had come too far and endured so much to have a grounding or mishap this late into this adventure. A text-book docking was made and we were quickly tied up. One small but big problem. The Marina was closed and there was no one around. They did not wait for us. We were down to less than quarter tank on fuel and we all needed shore power for the cold was setting in fast as the sun set over the creek already.

Our luck changed when the Marina Owner drove up and as he got out of his car, he had the look of seeing a ghost ship and a ghost crew walking about on his docks. He quickly said to us, "I thought that you would have given up seeing how heavy the weather had changed, and I assumed you were not coming today." He ran down the docks to turn on shore power, and his fuel pumps. We quickly fueled up and set the heat on high inside the cabins. The Marina Owner even offered to take us to town to sample one of the local eateries that was still open to the locals only. And what a treat that was, because this crew was famished and longed for some libations to calm ones nerves from the days pounding at sea.

Later on that evening we looked at weather radar and marine forecasts for the lower Chesapeake and we set a departure time of 0630 the next day. All of us fell asleep watching one of the seasonal college bowl football games. The next morning promised to give us new challenges as the previous day's rain fall had all froze on the decks and docks. We carefully departed the docks and found flat water in the creek, and then as we approached the Chesapeake, we saw our round number 2 of an angry winter storm trying to hang on as the weather front was trying to push off shore. Eastern weather forecasters were calling for heavy snowfall in the upper part of Virginia and the mid Atlantic states that day.

Into open water we cruised. The weather did settle down for us and the wind and wave action would not pick up speed until later that afternoon, in which case we had planned to be into Hampton Roads by then. Two footers were the norm and we would run into heavier seas as each major river from Virginia would dump its quarry of water into the Chesapeake. First the Rappahannock, then the York, and finally the James. These river confluences had a little going away message for us as we cruised right on by them. As we approached the open waters of Hampton Roads, a small treat for one of our crew members came as the VHF crackled a security message as Warship #72 was departing the Hampton Roads channel for open sea. That crew member actually spoke to a U.S. Naval Warship that day and he was pleased for the remainder of the trip. So proud of himself, he still speaks of it several weeks later.

The worst of this weather was now behind us as the remainder of the 2nd days journey would be in protected waters all the way to Coinjock. We had lady luck on our side with the bridge openings and we were tracking 1 hour ahead of schedule as we arrived in good order at Coinjock. Refueled and plugged in, we were now ready for that long overdue hot shower and the legendary prime rib special that was pre-ordered thanks to our cruise planner.

Day number 3 caused a major departure delay due to heavy fog. The weather front was changing again, and we had to wait for full daylight to show us the ½ mile visibility we had for most of that morning. High end cruising speed was restricted to half speed until visibility improved. Late that morning as we crossed the Albemarle Sound, visibility and speed increased accordingly. The Alligator River had pockets of poor visibility but with limited boating traffic, we had a lower risk of oncoming and flowing traffic. As a matter of fact we never saw boats until the late afternoon. The remainder of our journey was in protected waters until we crossed the Pamlico and Neuse Rivers.


Just like day one, the Pamlico River had all day to steep up its water's into 3's and 4's with a NW wind of 25 knots. Our approach to Goose Creek was a bit challenging when a strong gust blew out the canvas that was already ducked taped together. Foul weather gear was issued and we continued until we got into the ditch again. The same was for the Neuse River but the wind and wave actions were easier to deal with because of the ability to tack back and forth. The mid part of the Neuse River flattened out for our approach to Adams Creek. The remainder of our journey home was uneventful except for the very ugly docking into a new slip the owner of "Old Man River" had only seen from land. Frank Styers had several things to talk about that evening and the next day about the landing of "Old Man River". I am sure everyone in Winston-Salem had already heard about it before the end of that weekend.

With a warm welcome and reception group of about 20 witnesses, Old Man River was tied up to her new home in Pelletier Creek. She now awaits a small refit of canvas and some minor cosmetic work along with a planned re-naming ceremony. As the owners would like to properly bury the name "Old Man River" and ask the mighty God of the Seas; Neptune for proper dispensation and a new name to be welcomed and joined into the realms of the other famous boats of Pelletier Creek. The tired and exhausted crew went aboard "Liberty" for a home cooked meal of pasta, meat balls, and many libations. During the celebration meal they all spoke about the famous winter adventure they all endured. A journey no mariner will ever forget and a journey that bonds friendships forever.

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

Seamanship is the follow-up course to ABC-3 and covers marlinspike, anchoring, deck seamanship, rafting, customs, slow and fast speed boat handling, boat care, and maintenance. We have one member who will be taking the Junior Navigation exam soon to finish up a JN course that they began earlier. K.B. Jennings, Jr. found a great little article about man overboard situations and how to respond. Responding to man overboard situations are taught in our boating classes, however, how many of us practice this drill routinely to determine how we would respond if the situation actually occurred? An old or damaged PFD labeled "OSCAR" will suffice for the "victim" and the entire drill doesn't take but just a few minutes.

March 22nd-24th we had some of our member attend the District 27 50th Anniversary Spring Conference and Change of Watch. A couple of interesting programs were presented during the Squadron Education Officers breakout sessions, one of which should be familiar to the WSSPS.

During the morning session a youth sailing program based on the Optimist Pram was presented, almost identical to the Y-Sail program begun here in Winston-Salem some years ago. The USPS is hoping to push the program nationwide as a means of promoting boating interest and safety among youth and also more public exposure for local sail and power squadrons.

In the afternoon breakout session a presentation was made about a joint effort between the USPS and Boat US Foundation to present courses online. The goal is that by the end of they year all seminars will be online along with the Seamanship course. The Boat US Foundation has the membership numbers, media and support to make this happen and the USPS has the educational expertise. More detail information will be coming as this develops and courses are offered online.

Q & A MOB Recovery*

What are some basic steps for recovering a person who has fallen overboard?

Coast Guard statistics show that more the 70% of boating fatalities are the result of capsizes and falling overboard. The basics of a successful MOB recovery have changed little, with the exception of technology that can dramatically improve the odds of finding a person in the water. Here are some tips to remember.

- ◆ Point and push: whoever sees the person go overboard should immediately shout "man overboard" and "port" or "starboard," then point to and keep a constant eye on the person. The skipper should push the MOB button on the plotter or GPS to mark the coordinates.
- ◆ Throw: Throw a flotation device while the skipper executes a Willaimson Turn, heading 60 degrees to the side over which the person fell, then circling back to return on the reciprocal course.
- ♦ Retrieve: Upon return, keep the victim alongside the boat. At that point, the phrase "reach, throw, row and go" comes into play. If too far away to "reach," "throw" the victim a flotation device or line. If you can't get either of them close enough, "row" or slowly maneuver the boat closer. As a last resort, a strong swimmer wearing a PFD and carrying flotation can "go" to the victim and get him or her back to the boat.
- ◆ Technology: The Ray marine LifeTag is a wireless MOB system that sounds an alert on the boat the instant someone wearing it goes overboard (www.raymarine.com). Autotether also sounds an alert—or kills the engine- when someone wearing a sensor goes overboard (www.autotether.com). Kannad's new SafeLink R10 SRS is worn on a PFD and, when activated manually or automatically, sends alert messages, GPS position and identity code to AIS receivers with a 4-mile radius (www. Kannadmarine.com). Kannad was awaiting FCC approval so it can begin to sell the unit.

It crucial that you practice man-overboard drills so everyone knows their role and can swing into action when a situation arises.

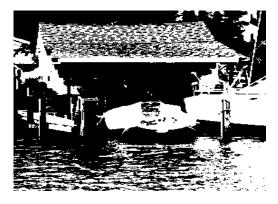
Somehow diversions have delayed the start of my squadron year to some extent. Other people have been sick; I have been out of town. If it would only warm up.

Fish House Chronicles

Harbors of Healing

What we offer this month is a poor substitute of a real good sea story. A tidal tale of "Tar heel Tidewater" at low tide. No broken down boats. No one ran aground. And no one fell in the water off the porch of the fish house. We are re-telling a tale for the first time about an official WSSPS cruise too and from Oriental. Some time ago into the not too distant past on the return cruise from Oriental to Morehead City some things happened along the way and some things went bump in the night. And some lessons were learned! And yes, Felix was there!!

It all started one beautiful May weekend when 6 or so boats cruised up Adams Creek and across the Neuse River bound for Oriental. A textbook adventure of flawless planning, all engines running good, and no one went on the wrong side of the markers. Not even a crab pot was run over and tangled around a prop shaft. Even Joel had no problems that weekend. All boats were expertly docked and tied with no one even so much as bumping a pole or striking another already docked boat while attempting to squeeze into narrow slips. Are we bored yet? Well if not, continue to read on.

The day went as good as it gets with finality at the famous M&M's Restaurant. An early meal was had by all and back to the Gemini we walked for our libation deserts were waiting. As we boarded the Gemini one couple that went for the ride only, finally spoke up and said that they could not spend the night and they needed to get back to Morehead City. With nightfall approaching in a couple of hours or less, Felix drew the short straw to ferry this couple back to Morehead City.

They boarded "April Star" which is a fast express cruiser for the journey back. Being conscious of the fact, that they may be cruising in the dark some of the way, Felix rigged up the stern light pole so he would be legal with proper navigation lighting. The departure was uneventful as they motored through the channel back into the Neuse River and when they were cleared of the no wake zone, Felix pushed the throttle down and warp speed he went. His boat speed began to climb to 15 knots, 20 knots, 30 knots and he top ended at 35 knots with a rooster tail behind them. The water conditions were somewhat flat so he had no problem making this speed most of the way into Adams Creek.

As you know, when running into the early evening, the sun can set very quickly and once that sun disappears, it is just a few moments later that visibility on open water begins to go away. No problem Felix hollered over the engine noise, we got running lights and I am putting them on now. As soon as he hit the switch, the combination bow light came on but the stern all around light lit up for a mini second and with a bright flash it went out. Just a bulb he thought, so he will deal with it. His lovely first mate went down below to search in the spot where he keeps spare bulbs, playing cards, shoelaces, bottle openers, and, behold, no spare bulb. But at least she found his lucky green marker. No problem he said to himself. We will fix it next day.

As the night sky turned blacker, Felix reduced speed so as to reduce the risk of collision with potential unmarked rowboats fishing in the middle of the creek. It has been known that both KB Jennings and Alex Cooper sometimes fish together at night with no lights in anticipation of catching a small tuna. With a speed reduction, the trip calculations got to be somewhat longer in time to arrival. 'Oh, well," said the crew, better safe than sorry because this is no means a race. As they cleared Sea Gate Marina entrance, they were what appeared to be the only boat left on the ICW at this time of night. Then the unthinkable happened. A small center console was lurking along side of the core creek bridge with his running lights on and behold, it was a wildlife officer.

The bright blue flashing lights came on and he steered toward Felix as if they were the get away boat for the aquatic Bonnie & Clyde. A young man, younger than our children, greeted them and tied up along side of Felix. He wanted to make them aware that they were running without a stern light which is a violation. Now Felix jumped up and he said what kind of violation? We all have life jackets on board he bleated to him. So the wildlife officer asked if everyone could put on their designated life jacket. The crew went looking for the jackets and behold, there were none on deck. They were all below. So Felix quickly went below to bring up a moldy and smelly safety bag with zippers that did not work.

Now the wildlife officer was grinning his teeth and counting the violations Felix may be in for. Felix emerged on deck with 4 legal and presentable but stinky life jackets. They passed the test. Now the issue with the missing light. Now Felix took some lessons from Leon and told the wildlife officer this story: You see officer, we were just cruising across the Neuse River and the water became very rough and we slammed a few breakers and I think that is where my stern light failed. It was working fine before we left Oriental. As Felix's nose began to get longer, the wildlife officer bought the fabricated story and just gave Felix a written warning. Now with report on board and some complimentary light sticks, the Felix crew continued their journey back to Morehead City with a written inspection

Now for those who remember the Newport River by Core Creek, and the many channels that may not be lighted showing you the way between 1 and 2 feet of water, traveling in this area at night could be considered very hazardous. It could be even catastrophic if you have Felix at the helm. So very slow speed they went.

Along the way as they entered the beginning of Core Creek, one crew member asked Felix if he had a working GPS and a paper chart. Another crew member asked Felix if he had a hand held spot light to help him find the way. Then there was a look of despair and fright over the face of Felix. Being the sort of planner he is, he never thought of those things because he had always depended on other members of the squadron to show him the way. And they always were showing him the way in daylight. With a little luck and a little plowing of the creek, Felix got lucky by raising his outdrive a little bit as he went down the wrong channel a couple of times. Five hours later, he found his way to the turning basin and it was homeward bound from there. What he thought was a 3 hour journey took almost 8 hours to get home. Thank goodness for Harbors of Healing. The next day everyone had forgiven Felix for not being so prepared. No damage to the boat. No one got hurt. Just a short night on sleep!

"Liberty"

Liberty is a President Marine double cabin motor yacht with the Model name: 37DC. She is a fast trawler design which means she cruises at 10 MPH but can get up to 20 MPH when needed for short periods of time.

She is a Taiwan built cruiser designed as a live aboard for a cruising couple. She can accommodate 2 couples and has berths for 5 with her 2 state rooms and 2 head design. Her overall length is 42' with a 37' water line. *Liberty* displaces 28,000 lbs. and is powered by twin Lehman Diesel Engines.

History

Liberty was built in Taiwan from June to September of 1987 and then shipped to Florida. She was commissioned in December of 1987 and named *Raisin Kane*. She cruised to the Caribbean during the winter of 1987 and 1988. In 1988, she cruised to the Chesapeake where she stayed for most of her years with an occasional trip to and from Florida for the winter in the early 1990's.

Raisin Kane changed hands in 1997 and she was re-named Lucky Ducks and was then confined to the Chesapeake Bay for cruising on weekends and longer summer cruises into VA, MD, and DE. Lucky Ducks was based in the Sassafras River in Georgetown MD. In 2007, Lucky Ducks was discovered by Don & Sheila Breault sitting in a covered slip in Georgetown, MD with a for sale sign on her. Lucky Ducks looked a little like a small project boat that needed some restoration and TLC. After some negotiations and a sea trial, she became the new floating condo for the Breault family In August of 2007, Lucky Ducks was moved to Morehead City, NC and quickly re-named *Liberty*. From the fall of 2007 to 2012, Liberty went through restoration projects and upmany



grades. She is fully restored and has the look of a well cared for cruiser.

Destinations

Liberty has been cruised along the entire NC coast to include the following ports of call: Southport, Bald Head Island, Wilmington, Wrightsville Beach, Cape Look Out, Beaufort, Ocracoke, Washington, Belhaven, New Bern, and Oriental. *Liberty* has logged over 3,600 NM while based in Morehead City, NC, and she has supported over 350 guest nights and hosted over 75 Power Squadron gatherings.

The Name

The story behind the name was based on the freedom of cruising the sea and the Intercoastal waterway. When docking in a different Port, her crew would be given liberty. Henceforth the freedom and independence of being able to move about freely and having liberty when docking in another port lead to the name of *Liberty*. Her engines have names as well; *Freedom* and *Independence*. Her Zodiac tender is named *Bell*. *Bell* being assigned to *Liberty* is also known as *Liberty Bell*. Perhaps a little New England Colonial History had some play in the name because the décor of Liberty reflects Early Americana style.




From the Helm Cdr. Wayne Creekmore, JN





"Be Prepared At All Times""

I guess everyone knows someone that ran out of fuel at one time or another. Most of the time no one will ever admit to such a silly and unforgivable mistake as running out of fuel. We even know some people who will always take on extra fuel even when they don't need it. We even know of one person who has put fuel in the fresh water storage tank so he will have more fuel capacity. You see when we purchase a boat and start using it, we seem to get concerned about the capacity of the fuel tank. Which means that many boat builders will build a boat with too small of a fuel tank. To avoid the frequent running back and forth to the fuel dock while on a cruise, we all want more fuel capacity so we can avoid the risk of getting too low on fuel during longer distances between ports, or more importantly the risk of being held hostage by a fuel supplier who thinks his and only his fuel is worth more per gallon than the current price of gold is per ounce.

Well my fellow cruisers, here is a real good sea story that will make you think about fuel capacity and dangers of running out of fuel. Or better than that, "Always Be Prepared". Please read on about another Felix adventure on the Neuse River.

It was a late December Saturday afternoon and the weather was seasonal with clear skies and cool temperatures. Felix had just launched his small cuddy cabin cruiser to take a trip to New Bern and return to his boat launch in Oriental at the end of the day. He and is lady friend had a wonderful day on the water and the experience in New Bern was just what they expected. This was going to be another great day in Felix's cruising adventures he would write about in a Power Squadron Newsletter. Felix had planned this to be his last cruise for the season as he had planned to dry dock his boat for the winter and do some off season maintenance and restorations.

On the way back to Oriental, Felix's lady friend noticed that the fuel gauge was reading almost empty. She mentioned that to Felix but Felix replied that this was no problem as he had planned to run his fuel tank almost empty so he could fill it with fresh gas later that month when he thought prices would drop a little. Well the sun began to set behind them and Felix had planned to arrive just in time to pull the boat on to the trailer at dusk. Good timing on his part but somehow he did not plan the fuel capacity mathematics that good.

The engine spit and sputtered and began to loose power real fast. Felix throttled down and when the boat settled down the engine gave a few more thrusts of limited power and a few more spits and a lot of sputters and then stopped. I mean it stopped dead in the middle of the river about ¼ mile from Oriental. Now the look on Felix's face was that of concern but the look on his lady friend was priceless. There was a small group of people along the bank of the river and they saw this flare. Then Felix quickly shot another one toward that group. The reaction Felix got was a very loud applause and many cheers as this crowd thought this was someone in a boat shooting fireworks. Felix began to shoot more flares and the applauses and cheers got louder. But no one would come to his rescue. Meanwhile, Felix's lady friend went below into the small cuddy cabin to find a blanket to wrap herself in because it was getting very cold out. The sun had already set and dusk was beginning to fade into the night. The look of despair came across Felix's face and he thought that he could just anchor in the middle of the river and he would flag someone down as they got near to him. But I guess you know what Felix found with his ground tackle.

A real nice rod and 6 feet of chain but no anchor. So the two sailors and the small cuddy began to drift further out to sea with Oriental now 1 mile to the north of their position and the current was moving very fast. A shiver began to work its way completely all over Felix's lady friend and she complained constantly about the cold. Felix knowing it was near the end of the season had taken all of the extra clothing and supplies out of the boat anticipating a very long winter storage. No food, no extra clothing, one smelly old wool blanket, and a few ice cold beers in the day cooler was all they had between the two of them. The time of desperation was upon the two shivering sailors. Now the minutes turned to hours as they continued to drift into the wide part of the river where it blended into the Pamlico. 




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

It also commemorates the 75th anniversary of the Hiram Percy Maxim Commemorative Station, W1AW. For more information on this special event, see page 93 in the June QST magazine or check the ARRL website at www.arrl.org. Information about the United States Power Squadrons can be found on their website at www.usps.org. Currently we are operating on a variety of frequencies. We will be on or near the following SSB frequencies throughout the day: 28.365, 21.365, 14.265, 7.265 MHz

The USPS is a non-profit organization founded in February 1914 dedicated to improving maritime safety through education and community service. USPS comprises 45,000+ members in 450 squadrons throughout the United States and its territories. It is America's largest non-profit boating organization.

The American Radio Relay League (ARRL) is the largest membership association of amateur radio enthusiasts in the USA. ARRL is a non-profit organization founded in May 1914 by Hiram Percy Maxim of Hartford, Connecticut. ARRL represents the interests of amateur radio operators before federal regulatory bodies, provides technical advice and assistance to amateur radio enthusiasts, supports a number of educational programs and sponsors emergency communications service throughout the country. The ARRL has approximately 154,000 members. In addition to members in the US, the organization claims over 7,000 members in other countries.

W1AW, currently celebrating its 75th anniversary, is both the amateur radio call sign and the primary operating station of the American Radio Relay League (ARRL). This station, which is com-commonly called the Hiram Percy Maxim Memorial Station, is located on the grounds of ARRL Headquarters in Newington, Connecticut. It was inspired by Maxim's 1AW call sign which predated the use of the AA-AL, K, N and W prefixes.

The original ARRL station was licensed with the call sign of W1MK and located in a National Guard building in Hartford, CT. After eight years of operation this flood plain location was destroyed by the waters of the Connecticut River in a 1936 flood. During this same year Hiram Percy Maxim, president and co-founder of the ARRL, died after serving 22 years as the organization's president. It was decided by the ARRL board of directors that a new station would be built as a memorial to their recently lost president and that the new station would assume his call sign of W1AW. On September 2, 1938 the new station was dedicated with the ceremonies being broadcast nationally over the radio. The Hiram Percy Maxim Memorial Station building appears much as it did when first built in 1938 and is now located next to the ARRL headquarters which was built much later, in 1963.

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



Stuck to the dock because it takes too long to clean it after. Stuck to the dock because Diesel Fuel went up a dime. Stuck to the dock because his crew decided to go shopping at Belkøs instead. Stuck to the dock because there is another dock party going on. Stuck to the dock because the wind is too strong.

What Felix will need now is a dinghy. Men and their toys. We go from a small boat we have a blast in, to a big boat we become paranoid to use, and then to a smaller 10 foot inflatable boat we can have a blast in. Maybe the lesson to learn is, stay with the smaller boat and get a condo to sleep in. It may be less costly in the long run and more fun than you ever realized. Plus the condo pool is great to watch and enjoy. Satisfaction meter is almost as high as a day at the cape when the water is flat.

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

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



"Boat Naming"

Naming a boat or renaming a boat can bring on a multitude of bad luck if not done properly. It can make your future boating experience something that you may regret and will want to forget if not carried out in a special ceremony. Renaming a boat especially is an event not to be taken lightly.

Since the beginning of time, sailors have sworn that there are unlucky vessels, and the unluckiest of vessels of all are those who have defied the õMythicalö Gods of the õSeven Seasö. Defying these õmythical õgods must never be done by changing a boats name without a proper ceremony to pay homage to these gods.

Research reveals that all accounts lead to a ceremony that involves lots of libations and offerings to the gods of wind and water. Some very elaborate ceremonies have involved backing the stern of the boat over the equator, or involving õvestal virginsö. A proper ceremony will involve the gods of the four winds: Boreas (North), Notus (South), Zephyrus (West), and Euros (East). It also involves the Mythical gods of water called Neptune (Roman) and Poseidon (Greek).

Legend has it that every vessel is recorded by name in the ledger of the deep and is personally known by Poseidon or Neptune. It is logical therefore that to change a name of a boat, one must purge it so old name first from the õledger of the Deepö and remove it from Poseidon memory.

Every boat has a spirit and those spirits must be awakened by a group of scaly wags and denizens of the deep to help with the name purge. A õWitch Doctorö and various assistants who pay homage to the old and ancient pirates of the Caribbean will assist the grand wizard in preparation of the actual ceremony. (they have also been known to be the keeper of the rum at the õFish Houseö)


The ceremony invokes Poseidon and Neptune to release the old name and introduce the new name by paying homage to the mighty rulers of the seas and oceans to whom all ships travel and venture upon. In appreciation of the dispensation in honor the greatness of these rulers of the seas and oceans, libations are offered to the majesty and court of the rulers of the deep. Then proper homage is paid to the rulers of the four winds. The four winds are brothers who will make weather something you will never forget if you attempt to leave them out.

Failure to do this ceremony properly by using the special and secret words only Wizards know how to use, can and will result in bad luck. This will also lead to many regrettable experiences one may have with a new boat.

Warning: anyone attempting to do this on their own can be swept away with a swift current or strong wind as these acts of ceremonial replications by uncertified and unapproved õWizardsö are never taken lightly by Poseidon or Neptune. Always remember to consult with the Winston-Salem Sail & Power Squadron for advice on who to use for help on these matters. Only they know the correct Wizards and Witch Doctors to use.

October is going to be busy in the education department as we have two course kicking off in October: ABC-3 and Piloting.

The ABC-3 course will be taught at the Old Town Recreation Center at 4550 Shattalon Drive, Winston-Salem, NC. The time and dates for the course are 7:00 - 9:00 pm on Tuesdays, October 1st, 8th, 15th, 22nd, and 29th. The cost for the public is \$50 which includes course materials and a 6 month trial membership in the Winston-Salem Sail and Power Squadron. This is a great opportunity for interested family and friends to learn about boating safety and be introduced to the Winston-Salem Sail and Power Squadron.

The USPS Piloting course will be taught on Thursdays, October 3rd, 10th, 17th, 24th, 31st, November 7th, 14th, 21st, December 5th, and 12th from 7:00 to 9:00 pm. at New Hope United Methodist Church at 5125 Shattalon Drive, Winston-Salem NC. The cost for the course will be \$70, which includes the Student Manual, Rose-Point Coastal Explorer DVD, Plotting and Labeling Guide, Weekend Navigator, USPS Course Plotter (4" x 15"), and Ultra-Light Dividers. This course teaches near shore navigations and covers bearings, relative bearings, dead reckoning, plotting, charts, sounding, GPS, and other skills needed to safely navigate in coastal waters.

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We have two seminars on the horizon: Knots, Bends, and Hitches and Basic Weather and Forecasting. These are short courses that cover topics that every mariner needs to know. Watch for updates in the Crossed Anchors and the WSSPS web page at www.wssps.org.


Now to delve into some educational/fun stuff I have been looking for a decent program that identifies the constellations based on lat/lon and time and I think this link works.



Winston Salem Sail and Power Squadron Donates over \$2,000 in cash and items to a North Carolina Based Wounded Warriors Organization

At the August membership WSSPS meeting, Larry Ledford of Lewisville, NC, a friend of Linda and Dennis Brigadier, and a member of DNA MilitaryNC, a 501-c-3 non-profit organization, spoke to the members about the volunteer work that has been done by him and others at a farm in Ararat, VA. The farm is owned by Mr. & Mrs. Stuart Epperson, Sr. of Winston Salem and consists of more than 1,000 acres. It is a working farm that raises beef cattle, soy beans and corn. The land has been in the Epperson Family for generations.

Larry has been involved in supporting our military and developing a military outreach ministry ever since the war began back in 2001. Larry was the co-founder of The OAR Foundation (www.theoarfoundation.org) and is now working his military ministry under DNA MilitaryNC (www.dnamilitary.org). These organizations have been very involved in helping Wounded Warriors and their families with home remodeling, building new houses, providing marriage retreats, and providing hunting, fishing and outdoor adventure trips to the farm in Ararat, Va.

There are two old farm houses located on the farm that are used for housing military guests and for ministry and training events. Wounded Warriors and their families are provided these facilities free of charge. The houses have been renovated and have modern heating and cooling units, handicap bathrooms, and kitchen facilities.

This ministry is 100% volunteer managed and operated. 100% of all donated funds that are received by DNA Military go to support the numerous projects at the farm. It has been the goal of the DNA Military and The OAR Foundation to provide these outreach facilities so that military families and the Warriors can work on rebuilding relationships. The military has a very high divorce rate; especially in the Special Operation Forces. The continuous deployments and severe injuries received by so many of our military are taking a high toll on our military families.

This military ministry has a very high rate of success in helping save marriages and parental relationships. Larry works closely with Chaplains from every branch of service to help identify the most õat-riskö soldiers who have serious martial problems, parental issues, and PTSD issues. Larry has had soldiers at the farm who have lost legs, arms and some have been wounded as many as 11 times. Many suffer from battle fatigue, combat trauma and physical pain.

The WSSPS has been able to provide pillows, sheets, blankets, quilts, mattress covers, 3 rocking chairs, a bread maker, a 30 cup coffee maker, a used washing machine, a propane heater, a used electric range and a 9øskiff with electric motor; as well as 5 adult life jackets. WSSPS also provided a twin bed frame with mattress set, 2 used vacuum cleaners and other miscellaneous items.

The farm continues to have needs. Avoiding the Ethanol Blues (From: BoatUS Marine Insurance Program)

If your boat's engine runs on gasoline, then you need to be careful how you put your fuel to bed for the winter. These days, most gasoline you buy at a gas station or fuel dock comes with 10 percent ethanol, which can cause problems if stored for months, especially if the temperature is changing. Ethanol is hydrophilic - it attracts and holds water. Small amounts of water will be burned in the combustion cycle, but ethanol can only absorb so much water. When it becomes completely saturated, phase separation occurs, and the corrosive ethanol-water mixture sinks to the bottom of the tank. If the engine is run, this mixture can damage seals, O-rings, injectors, and other delicate engine parts. The upper "gasoline" layer will be depleted of ethanol and have a reduced octane level, which can also cause engine problems. Leaving your tank half full for the winter can greatly increase the problems. First, there is more room in the tank and less fuel, which means more surface area for condensation formation and less ethanol to absorb the resulting water. Second, cycling temperatures from warm to cold also increases the amount of condensation. Finally, ethanol cannot absorb as much water at low temperatures as it can when it's warmer, so the gasoline will phase separate more quickly in colder temperatures. So what to do? If you can empty your tank completely, you should do so. If not, add stabilizer and fill it most of the way, leaving room for expansion and contraction of the gasoline.



õThe Cape Experience, Sharing The Connection of Sand And Water'ö

The Cape experience is a magical and yes sometimes a mystical opportunity you endure when you want a low keyed day on flat water less than 20 miles from places along the Bogue Sound. You can venture out on most days in any midsize live aboard trawler or small day use type boat with a shallow water draft and within one hourøs cruise; you can be beached or anchored in the hook of Cape Lookout. Also called õPower Squadron Spitö. If you do this in late September or early October, you can witness some of the finest weather and water conditions the Carolina coast has to offer.

On most late September days, you may get to see the playful action of dolphins surfing your wake, or witness the many Loggerhead Sea Turtles surfacing near your boat being curious as to your presence. Some days you can witness the playful prancing of the many õBankersö splashing along the beaches of Shackleford Banks. Then you can relax on the many miles of uncrowded sandy beaches watching the majestic appearance of the Cape Lookout Light House.

On an extreme rare occasion, you may witness a Southern Stingray breeching the water surface in pursuit of something or fleeing away from something. But needless to say that is indeed an extreme rare occasion to witness that as we have this fall. Then more turtles will surface to get an even closer look at your presence in this isolated place this time of year.

Then you call out to the õMermaid Expressö to get a lift off of the boat to the island. And to your surprise, a Mystical creature resembling a õMermaidö appears at the helm of a smaller center console. You get this lift to the island and behold, you step foot on an extreme deserted place where there are no other members of the human species present.
