Fish House Chronicles

"Changing Water into Wine"

"Felix Gets a Salt Water Farm Part Two"

It has been 8 weeks since Felix & Mandy moved to Saco Bay Maine. They have been diligently restoring his late Danny's salt water farm. First things came first for Felix. He found an old wooden dory that his uncle Danny used for fishing and tending his 5 lobster traps. This old wooden boat had to be restored and floated in the salty brine of Saco Bay so he too could continue the fishing tradition of his long time New England family. Plus, Felix also dreamed of bagging many bushels of cold-water clams so he could have a pot of "Steamers" to go along with his "lobsta" bake. Meanwhile back at the house, Mandy was busy cleaning, repairing doors, windows, and a part of the roof along with arranging for electricity to be restored to the farm.

Now we may have already guessed how this is going to end and it may not be pretty. Here is Mandy restoring a home to live in, and here is Felix restoring a boat to fish in. Who has the right priority for looking forward and it is already mid-November in Maine, and they have had their first killing frost and a light dusting of snow a couple of weeks ago. Mandy makes a detailed to do list and Felix reads it and finds a spot to have a beer and contemplate his thoughts on how to avoid the heavy lifting of home repairs and how to justify the time to go fishing. Soon the colder weather makes Felix feel a little uncomfortable being exposed to the freezing temperatures of early November and not having any heat in the house except for a fireplace and the supply of wood is at minimum levels.

Over the next few weeks, Mandy manages to round up some home improvement handy men and women to help get the home buttoned up for the winter. She has running water from the well, electricity restored, and an antique furnace that uses heating oil that sputters and smokes a lot but seems to get the job done when evening temperatures reach down in the upper teens. Felix has his fishing dory ready to float. The old dock that reaches into the salty brine of Saco Bay has seen better days and is not very stable to walk on let alone tie a boat too. Felix finds the remains of a once road worthy boat trailer and loads the dory on it and hooks it to his jeep so he can launch the boat for his first sea trial. Thank goodness that Uncle Danny had built a make shift boat ramp made from old oyster shells.

Felix remembers that the tides here are very long and that once he is in the water with his dory, he better get his jeep back up on high ground because he remembers a bad boat launch story that his friend Reid told him one day at the fish house and that story caused a certain member of the Winston-Salem Sail & Power Squadron to receive the coveted DEWDA award that year. We will not mention any names. So now Felix is off fishing in his little dory and the small 8 HP outboard spits and sputters as he motors out to his first lobster trap. Felix thinking lobster traps are like crab traps he set out in Bogue sound North Carolina. "Behold" he found out that these Lobster traps are big, heavy, and very deep. Maybe this is why commercial lobstermen use pulleys and cranes to hoist them.

After Felix manages to pull one of five traps, he decides this is way too much work as the one trap he manages to pull had a single one-pound lobster in it. So, after several hours of fishing and lobstering, Felix comes home with 3 lobsters, 2 blue fish, and one striper bass. This he feels will make a great feast for he and Mandy that evening. Once he manages to tie up his dory to the falling apart dock, he somehow manages to avoid falling into the water as he hauls his catch back to shore. He cleans the fish and puts the lobsters into a tub of cold saltwater until he is ready to steam them. Now for the remainder of his ingredients for a surprise feast tonight, he found a potato rake in the tool shed and digs up many long neck clams from the sandy beach and puts them into a burlap bag. We now have the makings of a down east clam bake.

Felix also notices that they are void of libations so after placing his booty of seafood into the outside refrigerator, he sets off to the "Packy." You see in Maine; they have no ABC stores. They sell alcoholic beverages in privately owned stores called Package Stores and the locals slang word for them is called the Packy. At the Packy, Felix gets a case of a wide variety of wines that he thinks will go well with seafood. Loading them into the jeep, he starts to head back to the farm. The late afternoon brings a very chilling northeast wind and he sees snow flurries falling. Better get directly home he thought, because this could be the season's first major snow fall!

As Felix made the final turn into the gravel road leading to his farm, the snow was now getting heavy and with the North East wind blowing at 20 knots, the snow was accumulating very fast against buildings and barns. Visibility toward the water was almost nonexistent. Felix parked less than 6 feet from the front porch and he left his case of libations outside on the porch. As he entered the house, the slight odor of a warm inviting fireplace fire hit his senses and made him feel very warm. Mandy told Felix that they may not have enough firewood to keep that fire going for more than a few hours. Then Felix said we need to cook all that wonderful fish I brought in this morning. We have lobsters, bass, and blue fish. He also told Mandy they had enough clams to make a steam pot. So, Felix quickly ran to the porch refrigerator to retrieve the fish, wash clams, and get the lobsters ready for the "Sauna." Meanwhile the snow was falling a pretty good clip and no sign of letting up. Mandy told Felix she needed water from the well pump outside because the plumbing in the kitchen was still being repaired.

Mandy started to boil water for the steamers and lobster, while Felix pan seared the fish. Mandy thought they had some left-over corn she purchased the other day at the A&P and she husked the 3 ears and placed them into one of the boiling pots. Then Felix started the process of introducing the lobsters to his stove top "Sauna" one at a time. The dinner was almost ready to serve when the power went out. Mandy told Felix she would need a couple more buckets of water to be brought in just in case they needed to heat the water for dishes later.

Felix easily complied, and went to the porch to retrieve the water buckets and noticed that the box of libations was sitting nearby, so he took a few bottles and placed them into one of the empty buckets and brough them to the kitchen.

The dinner was neatly presented on the kitchen table and Mandy used candles to light the way. How romantic was this setting; A down east style lobster bake with corn, steamers, fish, and a crackling fire in the fireplace with a Northeaster blowing in from the sea. Outside temperatures were briskly falling into the low 20's and the snow was accumulating very quickly. Mandy asked if Felix had any wine and he said yes, I do. He got up and went into one of what Mandy saw was a water bucket, and he poured a couple of glasses inside the bucket and brought them to the dinner table. Now Mandy not being able to see clearly because of the low light inside the house, could have sworn that Felix just retrieved water from the outside well into that same bucket and was now serving wine from it. Then she thought of the view a couple of months ago as she observed Felix walking on water in the shallows of low tide.
